# AUTHORIZING ACCEPTANCE OF JUSTICE AND MENTAL HEALTH COLLABORATION GRANT PROGRAM FUNDS, AMENDING THE 2010 BUDGET, AND AUTHORIZING CONTRACT

1 WHEREAS, the U.S. Department of Justice, through the Bureau of Justice Assistance, has appropriated 2 funding for grants with the goal being to increase public safety through innovative cross-system

3 collaboration for individuals with mental illness and/or co-occurring mental health and substance use

4 disorders (MI/COD) who come into contact with the criminal justice system; and,

WHEREAS, Rock County submitted an application for a planning grant to conduct a full needs and resource assessment and design a strategic, collaborative plan to initiate systemic change for the identification and treatment of offenders with MI/COD in Rock County, in April 2010; and

WHEREAS, on September 8, 2010, Rock County's application was approved in the amount of \$62,569,
 including \$50,000 in Federal Aid and \$12,569 in-kind services match; and,

WHEREAS, this planning grant, over 12 months beginning October 1, 2010, will be primarily used to hire a consultant to conduct an intensive needs and resource assessment and visit best practice sites with regard to MI/COD in the criminal justice system; and,

WHEREAS, strategic planning will focus on diverting non-violent adults and juveniles with MI/COD from the justice system at the earliest point possible and providing them with the treatment they need to reduce recidivism and become productive members of society; and,

WHEREAS, this grant will be managed programmatically, including administration of contracts under this grant, by the Rock County Administrator's Office and fiscally by the Rock County Sheriff's Office; and,

WHEREAS, a CJCC subcommittee will be established representing support from all levels of government, justice, mental health and AODA treatment services, transportation, housing, advocates, consumers, and family members. This collaboration will ultimately form the basis for a problem solving model or strategic plan.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Rock County Board of Supervisors duly assembled this <u>73<sup>rd</sup></u> day of <u>September</u>, 2010 does hereby accept the Justice and Mental Health Collaboration Program Grant funds in the amount of \$62,569 from the U.S. Department of Justice.

#### **Executive Summary**

# AUTHORIZING ACCEPTANCE OF JUSTICE AND MENTAL HEALTH COLLABORATION GRANT PROGRAM FUNDS, AMENDING THE 2010 BUDGET, AND AUTHORIZING CONTRACTS

The U.S. Department of Justice, through the Office of Justice Programs, Bureau of Justice Assistance, has authorized funding for grants through the Mentally Ill Offender Treatment and Crime Reduction Act of 2004 and the Mentally Ill Offender Treatment and Crime Reduction Reauthorization and Improvement Act of 2008. The goal of the grant is to increase public safety through innovative cross-system collaboration for individuals with mental illness or co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders (MI/COD) who come into contact with the criminal justice system.

On September 8, 2010, Rock County was awarded a \$50,000 planning grant to design a strategic, collaborative plan to initiate systemic change for the identification and treatment of offenders with MI/COD. The twenty percent match (of \$12,569) for which the County is responsible will come in the form of an in-kind personnel match, as opposed to any monetary expenditure by the county.

The planning grant requires development of an effective collaboration representing support from all levels of government, justice, mental health and AODA treatment services, transportation, housing, advocates, consumers, and family members. This collaboration will ultimately form the basis for a problem solving model, or strategic plan, to intercept individuals from the system at the earliest point possible while promoting public safety.

Strategic planning will focus on diverting non-violent adults and juveniles with MI/COD from the justice system at the earliest point possible and providing them with the treatment they need to reduce recidivism and become productive members of society. Specific objectives of the planning process are to determine what information should be tracked and how to create a system for tracking such data; enhance communication and coordination between justice entities, mental health providers, and AODA providers; increase diversion strategies for MI/COD offenders; and increase the number of justice personnel with knowledge about MI/COD. A cross-systems strategic plan will be designed to improve the nexus between the mental health, AODA, and justice systems.
