<u>AUTHORIZING JUSTICE AND MENTAL HEALTH GRANT PROGRAM AD HOC</u> **COMMITTEE**

WHEREAS, in September 2010, Rock County received a Justice and Mental Health Collaboration

Planning Grant through the U.S. Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance; and, 2 3

WHEREAS, the goal of the grant is to increase public safety through innovative cross-system 4

collaboration for individuals with mental illness and/or co-occurring mental health and substance use 5

disorders (MI/COD) who come into contact with the criminal and juvenile justice systems; and

WHEREAS, the four key components of the planning process for the grant are as follows: (1) creating 8

a committee of representatives from criminal/juvenile justice stakeholders, mental health and AODA 9

agencies, and community organizations/members to form a strong collaborative structure through

11 which a strategic plan will ultimately be created; (2) conducting an intensive cross-systems needs and

12 resource assessment; (3) developing policies and programs for systems improvement; and (4)

13 developing a cross-systems strategic plan for future program implementation.; and,

WHEREAS, the committee developed under this grant will be a diverse, interagency committee charged with assessing the County's current mental health, AODA, and criminal/juvenile justice systems and developing specific strategies to address gaps in mental health/AODA services for those with MI/COD

in these justice systems; and, 18 19

20 WHEREAS, the committee will oversee and work with a hired consultant that will conduct a full needs 21 and resource assessment in relation to MI/COD in the criminal and juvenile justice systems in Rock

County and work with said consultant in developing a strategic plan; and. 22

24 WHEREAS, the committee will present a strategic plan or report to the full CJCC for comments. 25 approval, and future implementation; and,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Rock County Board of Supervisors duly assembled 28 this 14th day of October, 2010 authorizes an Ad Hoc Committee to work on the

29 aforementioned planning grant activities and to develop a set of goals and objectives to be followed 30 throughout the planning process, oversee the needs and resource assessment, and ultimately work to

31 create a strategic, data-driven plan to address MI/COD in the criminal and juvenile justice systems in

32 Rock County. The Ad Hoc Committee will also report their findings and recommendations to the full

33 Criminal Justice Coordinating Council (CJCC); and,

35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the CJCC will report to the County Board its strategic plan or 36 report for addressing individuals with MI/COD in the criminal and juvenile justice systems; and,

38 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Chair of the Rock County Board of Supervisors be authorized

39 to appoint up to 11 individuals to serve on this Ad Hoc Committee and select the Chair of the Committee,

with consideration to be given to the key stakeholders in the adult and juvenile justice systems and 41 mental health/AODA fields, as well as community groups/members that interact with those with

42 MI/COD, and a mental health consumer; and,

44 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that upon completion of the project, anticipated in October 2011, the 45 Ad Hoc Committee will be dissolved.

Executive Summary

AUTHORIZING JUSTICE AND MENTAL HEALTH GRANT PRORAM AD HOC COMMITTEE

The U.S. Department of Justice, through the Office of Justice Programs, Bureau of Justice Assistance, has authorized funding for grants through the Mentally Ill Offender Treatment and Crime Reduction Act of 2004 and the Mentally Ill Offender Treatment and Crime Reduction Reauthorization and Improvement Act of 2008. The goal of the grant is to increase public safety through innovative cross-system collaboration for individuals with mental illness or co-occurring mental health and substance use disorders (MI/COD) who come into contact with the criminal justice system.

On September 8, 2010, Rock County was awarded a \$50,000 planning grant through the aforementioned program to design a strategic, collaborative plan to initiate systemic change for the identification and treatment of offenders with MI/COD. The planning grant requires development of an effective collaboration representing support from all levels of government, justice, mental health and AODA treatment services, transportation, housing, advocates, consumers, and family members. This collaboration will ultimately form the basis for a problem solving model, or strategic plan, to intercept individuals from the system at the earliest point possible while promoting public safety.

This diverse, interagency collaboration will be formalized through an Ad Hoc Committee designated by the County Board. The committee will work with a hired consultant to perform a comprehensive assessment of its criminal/juvenile justice, mental health, and AODA systems in Rock County. Ultimately, a strategic plan, focusing on evidence-based practices, will be devised to guide the County's future actions in dealing with this challenging population.
